

National curriculum objectives:

Identify and name a variety of common animals (including carnivores, herbivores and omnivores; including fish, mammals, reptiles, birds, amphibians).

Identify, name, draw and label the basic parts of the human body and say which part of the body is associated with each sense.

Describe and compare the structure of a variety of common animals (fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals including pets).

Develop a wide range of art and design techniques; use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination.

Key knowledge:

- There are five senses: touch, taste, hear, sight and smell.
- Carnivares are animals that have a diet that consists mostly of meat.
- Herbivores are animals that do not eat meat and instead eat plants,.
- Omnivores are animals that have a diet that consists of meant and plants.
- There are <u>six</u> main groups of animals. These are: invertebrates, mammals, birds, amphibians, reptiles and fish.
